MOSAIC

The purpose of the committee is to promote cultural awareness and develop strategies for effective outreach services. In adhering to this, the Committee meets four times a year to discuss any and all issues that arise within the libraries that affect service to our diverse communities. These issues can range from collection development, to programming ideas, to creating documents in non-English fonts, to where to send a non-English speaking person for immigration information. The Committee would like to think of itself as a clearinghouse on best practices in serving diverse communities. One of our main goals is to disseminate and share information in a collegial fashion.

Patchogue-Medford Library



- -Bilingual staff available every day
- -Commonly requested documents (such as translated DMV forms) kept at the Reference desk
- -Collections in Spanish (and small but growing Turkish collection) as well as bilingual books available
- -Bilingual Signage, fully translated website
- -Serves a community of approximately 65,000 people in Patchogue Village, North Patchogue, East Patchogue, and Medford

Middle Country Public Library







- Serves approximately 60,000 people in the Centereach and Selden communities.
- Patrons that speaks a language other than English at home:
 - Centereach 11720: 18.3%
 - Selden- 11784: 17.4%
- Offers basic and intermediate Class on Thursday evenings and Saturday mornings.
- Offers Citizenship Preparation Class on Wednesday nights
- Regional business center for Long Island and specialized services like career and college counseling.

Mastics-Moriches-Shirley Community Library





The **Tri-Hamlet Community** is rich in local history, settled in the late 1600s and home to a signer of the Declaration of Independence.

MMSCL was established in 1974; it has grown and evolved. The 45K sq. foot main library branch is undergoing renovation (opening 9/2024). Two 7K sq. foot branch locations are open in Mastic Beach and Moriches.

MMSCL serves approximately **55K patrons** in the Mastic, Mastic Beach, Shirley, and Moriches communities (in the William Floyd School District). Approx. **21%** of patrons speak languages other than English at home. Our diverse program serves patrons from all around the world- about 40 counties/20 languages per year.

MMSCL offers **services** and **resources** for **patrons** of all ages. For New Americans, we have a robust offering of English, Citizenship, and Family Literacy classes, approx. 30 per week, in varying levels, with childcare. We have helped almost 200 new citizens and offered 40 citizenship scholarships in the past 15 years.

The Community Family Literacy Project **CFLP** is a 501c3 organization that supports literacy in our community through book giveaways, scholarships, and more. We believe that education empowers individuals, families, and communities!


English Class 101




Set the scene: while sitting at the Reference Desk, there have been many inquiries from English Language Learners (ELLs) about English classes.


Things to Think About:

- Teacher: volunteer or paid, library staff members or public, individual/individual/small group//large group, conversation groups
- Registration: student application, placement test, level
- Schedule: how many hours per class, days per week, weeks per session, rolling admission, rolling or standard admission
- Materials: textbook/workbook, dictionary, dictionary, websites
- Resources: Kahoot, Easy English News, Language Learning apps, Cell ED

Library Partnerships



Libraries and Schools: a good relationship between public libraries & schools benefits students & families in a community

- Building relationships and communicating with parents, students, and faculty helps us help them!
 - Ex. Teachers may request a collection of books on a certain topic of study
 - Ex. Library holds after-school activities/clubs in the school buildings
- AtendAttend school events
 - For example, Back-to-School nights, ENL Nights, Moving Up ceremonies, Kindergarten Registration,
 Parent-Teacher Conferences, and more
- GGood opportunity for outreach in the community in the community
 - o Bring library card applications, copies of the newsletter, books, and more
 - Goal: outreach includes at least 1 bilingual staff member

Libraries and Businesses: partner with businesses for programming opportunities utilizing local expertise, offer business related workshops, facilitate a business cooperative, donations/prizes, donations/prizes, etc.

Libraries and Communities: lean into local history, Community Scavenger Hunts, On-the-Road programs, Laundromat Literacy, share meeting room space with the public, foster relationships with local emergency service personnel and elected officials, community organizations, etc.

New York DMV



- DMV website is available in 16 languages in addition to English
- Many of the forms (such as permit applications) are translated.
- There are copies of the Driver's Manual, motorcycle manual, and CDL manual, Motorcycle Manual, CDL manual in English and Spanish.
- The Permit Test is given in 19 languages
 - https://dmv.ny.gov/driver-license/get-your-learner-permit-and-first-driver-license
- DMV FAQ- keep copies of some of the most requested forms (in other languages) by the Reference Desk.
- Green Light Law- opens eligibility for a license by opens eligibility
 for a license by proving identity/residency (ID-44)

Foreign Consulates in NY



- Some consulates offer programs & resources for its citizens who live in New York. These include cultural activities and High School diploma programs.
 - For example: The Ecuadorian Consulate of NY (CECUNY) offers OSHA
 30-hour courses (in Spanish) for its citizens in NY.
- Good practice: check what consulates may have to offer to the diverse populations in your community
- Idea: create a Shared Drive document with information for foreign consulate locations, appointment making websites, and contact information

United States Citizenship



United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) is the government agency that oversees lawful immigration to the United States. USCIS "upholds America's promise as a nation of welcome and possibility with fairness, integrity, and respect for all we serve."

Visit https://www.uscis.gov/ for information and instructional videos. It is encouraged to create an **online account**; you can submit applications, upload documents, pay fees, and get status updates for your case.

Naturalization is the process to become a U.S. citizen if you were born outside of the United States. If you meet certain requirements, you may become a U.S. citizen. It involves a civics test (The 100 Questions), reading and writing test, and verbal skills assessment.

Updated fUpdated fees required for most immigration applications and petitions went intowent into effect

April 1, 2024. To file the **N400**, the fee is now \$760 (plus \$50 discount for filing online).

USCIS offers free educational products for teachers and administrators to help prepare students for the naturalization process.






The Digital Divide

Digital Literacy is "the ability to use information and communication technologies to find, evaluate, create, and communicate information, requiring both cognitive and technical skills."

The **Digital Divide** is the gap between those who have access to technology, the internet and digital literacy training and those who do not. In an increasingly technological society, lack of digital skills and accessibility can have negative consequences.



Limited English Proficiency Speakers

Among those who speak a language other than English at home and speak English "less than well"—what we define as Limited English Proficiency (LEP) speakers—the rate of those without high-speed internet at home is significantly higher. More than one-third, or 35.4 percent, of LEP individuals in New York did not have high-speed internet at home in 2019. Almost half a million LEP individuals were without high-speed internet.

What makes Literacy Suffolk unique?

- Our program is student goal-centered, so there is not a "one curriculum fits all" approach
- Majority of our students are tutored one-on-one in a Suffolk County library
- We help both Basic Literacy and English Language Learners.
- 3 ways to be trained as a volunteer tutor: online, in person, live Zoom
- Trained volunteers testers that assess students English level
- Tutors receive continuous support from their regional coordinators and they can all take advantage of NYSED professional development through the Long Island Regional Adult Education Network.
