The Lessons We've Learned: Summary & Advice

- 1. Inform your patron in advance of the appointment that they will need a research goal.
- 2. It will help if the patron has names, dates, and locations of family members.
- 3. Give them a blank pedigree chart. (misbach.org)
- 4. There is more than just Ancestry.
- 5. Patrons don't know what they are looking at or what is available.
- 6. Know what you have in your library.
- 7. As always, build a collection that supports your users' needs.
- 8. Know your local history and what information sources you have in your community.
- 9. It is okay to direct them to a book or another research institution.
